Incident Summary – Q4000 Rd

The Q4000 Road fire started on July 7th around 9pm. We had a report of a smoke investigation and while crews were enroute we spotted a thermal column on the Q4000 rd. On arrival we found ¼ acre active fire with two large piles burning as well. The fire is currently under Investigation.

There will be smoke in the area for a few days; please limit your 911 calls unless you see something other than smoke.

Objectives for today:

Crews will continue to mop-up and secure the perimeter throughout today's shift. It is anticipated that the incident will be monitored for several days by the Washington Department of Natural Resources.

Evacuations: None

Check with Jefferson County Emergency Management website for any update with evacuation levels.

Be alert and stay aware of the danger that exists in your area; evacuations are voluntary.

Public and firefighter safety is the highest priority on the Q4000 Road Fire.

Weather:

This Afternoon

Sunny, with a high near 92. Northeast wind 3 to 6 mph.

Tonight Clear, with a low around 62. Northeast wind around 5 mph becoming calm in the evening.

Tuesday Sunny, with a high near 94. Light north-northeast wind.

Tuesday Night Clear, with a low around 60. North wind around 5 mph becoming calm in the evening.

Wednesday Sunny, with a high near 85. Calm wind becoming north northeast around 5 mph in the afternoon.

Closures: No roads or hiking trails.

Resources: Overhead 2, Engines/Tenders 3, Heavy Equipment 1, Total Personnel 15

Public Safety: Firefighters and heavy equipment are working on and around the area roadways. You can help keep firefighters and the public safe by driving carefully and avoiding these areas.
